



What is the Black Death?


- epidemic/pandemic

Recent discoveries: paleogenetics


- 2001 sequencing of genome of Yersinia pestis
- 2010 genetic mapping of modern samples of plague
- 2011 recovery of Yersinia pestis DNA from past victims



Types of plague

- bubonic plague -> pustule/buboes -> esp. in lymph nodes
- pneumonic plague -> affected lungs; highly contagious; spread by coughing and sneezing; kill in 24 hours
- septicemic plague -> bloodstream; 100% mortality

Symptoms

- fever
- headaches
- vomiting
- skin lesions
- muscle spasms or stiffness
- restlessness
- delirium

Reactions



- Isolation
- Drinking, feasting
- Extreme reactions: atonement, scapegoating

Scapegoating

Victims: Jews, lepers, prostitutes, clergymen (priests and monks), foreigners

Socio-economic effects


- depopulation = scarcity of labour = better wages or landholding terms
- reaction by lords
- Peasant Revolts in England (1381) and France (1358)
- contraction of economy
